

# Selected Bibliography

A good portion of this list of references in this selected bibliography is drawn from my extensive personal art history library, which I have accumulated over many years and consulted frequently as I pursued my fascination with and research on Vincent van Gogh, his art, his life, his letters, and his mysterious death.

The present effort on understanding these suspicious circumstances surrounding his death, as you will see, has very little value derived from Vincent's letters. None of his letters actually apply to his last few days alive in Auvers-sur-Oise, France, or shed light directly on his death or the reason "WHY" he was murdered. There is nothing specific to the circumstances surrounding his unexplained death that can be gleaned from his many available letters, unless there are missing letters that we are not privy to. Please see Appendix V for a more indepth look at this aspect of Vincent's enigmatic saga!

The below list encompasses sources both specifically mentioned and generally alluded to in this book. Consider the titles below as previously consulted, but not necessarily cited, as much of the information in this book appears in many sources and has already entered widespread public knowledge. Therefore, I have only cited information when explaining where a concept or a quote came from driving home a significant point, or supplying additional clarification.

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## Video Bibliography

A definitive forensic assessment was conducted by the *Killing Vincent* team in 2018 using an 1870s Lefeacheux seven millimeter firearm to discharge pin-fire black powder bullets into FBI-grade clear ballistic gel, covered in a 100 percent cotton shirt. The shirt was then examined to assess how clothing might interact with the flame and skin. The test firing was conducted at varying distances: contact (point-blank), six inches, twelve inches, eighteen inches, and twenty-four inches. For each test distance, three shots were fired into the cotton covered ballistic gel.
